

After hearing of another young man take his life yesterday, for some unknown reason, and having a very meaningful conversation with a long time mate, I have to tell you all this. I want you all to listen. Please just listen.

For those of you who leave the military, particularly after many years' service, who struggle to find your place, to feel complete, and for those of you who are worried about leaving, because it's 'who you are', I give you this thought. The military is, by its very nature, designed to replace you in a heartbeat. You will leave today, and tomorrow, it will be like you were never there. You will be replaced. They will get the job done without you. That's the nature of the job. While you no doubt make a difference, and your service is vitally important to this nation, you will soon be forgotten and no longer needed. You can and will be replaced.

But do you know who cannot replace you? Your family. Your wife. Your sons and daughters. Your brothers and sisters. Your mother and father. Your FAMILY. To them, you cannot be replaced. There is no substitute for you as a father, a mother, a brother or sister. A daughter or son. If you are struggling after leaving the military, or struggling with the decision to leave, think about what really matters. Your family, and how much you mean to them. And how much they mean to you.

And for those who think or feel they lose their identity when they leave the military, I can tell you now you're wrong. You will always be a soldier, a sailor or an airman/woman. ### **NEWS FROM RSL QLD**

### STATEMENT REGARDING IGADF AFGHANISTAN INQUIRY REPORT

The impact of the Inspector-General of the Australian Defence Force's (IGADF) Afghanistan Inquiry report has been felt across Australia's Defence and veteran communities.

RSL Queensland stands shoulder to shoulder with Queensland's Defence family to ensure a bright future and enduring legacy for all veterans and their families and will continue to support all Defence personnel during this time.

While the IGADF report detailed serious allegations, RSL Queensland State President Tony Ferris denounced the damaging speculation that has pre-empted the legal process.

"As Australians, we owe our Defence personnel the right to due legal process, including the presumption of innocence that lies at the heart of our legal system," Mr Ferris said.

"If illegal or unethical activities are found to have occurred, then those individuals responsible must be held accountable.

"But we are very concerned about the effect ongoing speculation may have on the mental health of all veterans, not just those who are the subject of these allegations."

He said public and media speculation about the alleged criminal behaviour of a small number of Special Air Service Regiment soldiers in Afghanistan – before the claims are investigated by the Australian Federal Police – was detrimental to the vast number of professional and dedicated current and former service men and women.

Mr Ferris warned such speculation would unjustly taint the reputations of the majority of Australia's Defence personnel who served and continue to serve their country with integrity and distinction.

"Australia's Defence family is driven by a deep sense of purpose, they serve with pride and regularly put their lives on the line in service to our nation," he said.

"Many suffer traumatic experiences while serving and every day, RSL Queensland is called on to support veterans who are dealing with the aftermath of their operational service.

### **DVA Information for members**

### UNMARKED FIRST WORLD WAR GRAVES NOW IDENTIFIED

THE graves of around 150 First World War veterans have been identified and appropriately marked through the Government's Unmarked First World War Graves program. Minister for Veterans' Affairs Darren Chester said the two-year pilot program was attracting interest from associations and individuals throughout Australia and recently received its 200th application.

"One of the successes of the Anzac Centenary is that many Australians discovered unknown family connections that they had to the First World War, as well as members of the general community becoming more interested in our military history," Mr Chester said.

"This has led to organisations and individuals across the country discovering First World War veterans from their local communities who might lie in an unmarked grave. "After the First World War many veterans came back to Australia seeking a quiet life in the country or they took up a Soldier Settler farm, leading many to live in regional areas and often separated from family.

"Many of these veterans when they died may have been buried without a funeral or a permanent headstone and were not provided an official commemoration.

"This program makes funding available to individuals or associations to assist in marking unmarked graves and I am pleased to be extending this program for a further six months.

"Australia can never repay the debt owed to those who served and gave their lives, but we demonstrate our gratitude and respect in our cemeteries in Australia and overseas."

The 200th application was received from Forgotten Diggers in New South Wales to recognise Private Thomas William Shiner who is buried at Glen Innes Cemetery in NSW. Five applications were recently received from Port Pirie, South Australia, to provide grave markers for men such as Private Leslie Simpson who was awarded the Military Medal for 'great gallantry' at Bullecourt in 1917; Private Albert Sjostrom who became the president of the Port Pirie RSL; and Private Clifford Price, a fireman who served with the South Australia Fire Brigade.

The program offers up to \$450 to assist with the cost of a grave marker or as a contribution towards a larger cost and has been extended until 30 June 2021. For more information on the eligibility requirements, visit the DVA website or email War.Graves@dva.gov.au

### NATIONAL NETWORK OF MENTAL HEALTH FIRST AIDERS – Forwarded as belt & braces.

AUSTRALIANS who support veterans and their families are being trained as 'Mental Health First Aiders' through free training offered by Open Arms – Veterans & Families Counselling and ex-service organisations around the country. Minister for Veterans' Affairs Darren Chester said Mental Health First Aid and suicide prevention training offers veterans, and the people who support them, an opportunity to 'square away' their own mental health so they can take care of themselves and those around them.

Whether it's packing your kit or sorting yourself and gear in other ways, 'squared away' is a military concept where once you have yourself sorted, you are then able to help those around you.

"It's not too dissimilar with mental health and I am encouraged that more than 1400 members of the veteran community have participated in mental health and suicide prevention training in the last 12 months," Mr Chester said. "Family members, friends and colleagues are often the first to notice subtle changes in someone's behaviour and training in Mental Health First Aid or suicide intervention equips them with the skills and confidence to identify signs, start a conversation and encourage them to seek professional help.

"This training, initiated by the Returned and Services League (RSL), is now being delivered in partnership with exservices organisations across Australia, highlighting the great outcomes we can achieve by working together. "I would encourage anyone in the ex-service community to become a Mental Health First Aider and join our national network by contacting Open Arms and participating in the training.

"The recent Budget provided an additional \$101.7 million to further increase mental health support services for our veterans and their families, further demonstrating our commitment to supporting the health and wellbeing of our veteran community."

In addition to Mental Health First Aid, Open Arms provides suicide prevention training including the Applied Suicide Intervention Skills Training (ASIST), Suicide alertness for everyone (safeTALK), and Suicide Prevention Start, a 60-90 minute self-paced online workshop.

Former Warrant Officer of the Air Force, and now a National Director in Open Arms, Rob Swanwick, said Open Arms is proud to provide training that can save lives.

"In the same way we are trained in physical first aid, we want to upskill people in mental health first aid. There's a great sense of camaraderie and mutual support in the veteran community that comes from shared experiences, and being able to strengthen the ethos of covering each other's back is incredibly important and rewarding," Mr Swanwick said.

"It reminds me that as a Loadmaster, I gave the brief hundreds of times, and we all know it well; in an emergency, get your own oxygen on and look after yourself first so you can better assist others around you."

In addition to providing free and confidential support for current and ex-serving ADF personnel and their families, Open Arms offers a variety of free training opportunities to those seeking to help family, friends, co-workers or others in the veteran community: <u>Suicide intervention and mental health literacy workshops</u>. 

### Planning Ahead "Commemoration Planning"

The following information has been provided by Paul Nothard, AM, CSC, CSM (Director, Office Of War Graves) that may be of interest. It is in all members best interest to have clear instructions left with NOK. DVA can provide a Planning Ahead booklet to assist in this regard. Please also ensure your NOK information is recorded correctly at State Office. Below is information received from the Office of War Graves.

- Eligibility for Official Commemoration: A veteran <u>must</u> have "qualifying service" to be eligible for an official commemoration. It's important to note that OAWG / CWGC only commemorate war service. We are not able to recognise all types of service through official commemoration.
- Qualifying service includes "war" service or "non-warlike" service (ie/ peacekeeping, truce monitoring etc).
   Information on our web page identifies that the following service is <u>not</u> viewed as qualifying service:
  - Peacetime Defence Service (MRCA and Part VI VEA)
  - o Defence Hazardous Service (Part IV VEA)
  - o British Nuclear Test Defence Service (Part IV VEA)
  - Peacekeeping service by a person other than a member of the ADF (Part IV VEA)
  - Service with other nations' forces other than as a member of the ADF (regardless of any eligibility for Australian Repatriation Benefits)
- For those that meet the eligibility criteria (for example a TPI recipient who has the requisite qualifying service), then regardless of the cause or date of death, they will be eligible for an official commemoration.
- Use of Service Badges. Defence have only provided OAWG with authority to provide permission to use the
  three service badges on private commemorations. Use of all others must be applied for through the respective
  Brand Manager (for Army, RAN or RAAF) or to the ADF Brand Manager for those seeking permission to use the
  ADF logo.
- Planning Ahead. Speaking to our families and leaving behind clear instructions on the veteran's wishes regarding burial and official commemoration wording
  - O Unfortunately, the system that we work within requires the process for acceptance of an official commemoration to be triggered by the DVA Bereavement Team following the passing of the veteran.
  - Sending out blank forms has caused problems in the past, where veterans who are not eligible for
    official commemoration have filled them out and provided them to their families, who are then
    subsequently devastated to find out that the veterans wishes can't be met.
  - While we can't send out an incomplete form, Veterans can go on line into MyAccount and select "Commemoration Planning" from menu and mark their preferences there. As a side note, DVA is looking to shift this function across to "MyService" in the future.

To Vietnam veterans and their families:

The new Agent Orange/PTSD Official History is out. This is the story of our troubled homecoming told accurately, compassionately, and eloquently by historian Peter Yule.

Some of the story is told through the eyes of over 100 veterans Peter Yule and his team interviewed. Some of the story is a rollicking yarn about veterans' conflict with the bureaucracy and government And some of the story is the technical review of studies, written so we all can understand, on the health of veterans and their families.

Peter Yule delves deeply into the tragedy of the traumatic effects of the war on so many of those who fought it and on their families.

He delves deeply too into the controversy over whether veterans were harmed by their exposure to a variety of herbicides and insecticides.

On this exposure issue, there are two parts.

One is the purely scientific question of how toxic were these chemical agents including the most recognised, Agent Orange. The second part is that which was pursued by the Vietnam veteran movement and, indeed, was the reason for their activism. It stemmed from the veterans' belief that the Department of Veterans Affairs was unfairly rejecting compensation claims based on chemical exposure. The unfairness resulted, the veterans' argued, from the Department not giving veterans the 'benefit of the doubt' prescribed under Repatriation law. It tells the whole story and is recommended for those who would like to know and understand the whole picture.



# **NEW VETERAN CARDS ON THE WAY**

DVA Gold, White and Orange health cards have been replaced with a new-look Veteran Card. Your existing health benefits and entitlements will remain unchanged with the new card. You should destroy your old DVA health card when the new Veteran Card arrives. The Veteran Card provides a way for the Australian community to recognise and connect with veterans and acknowledge service to the nation.

As well as continuing to enable you to get access to health services, the new cards also provide additional benefits from businesses, organisations and community groups who support the Australian Defence Veterans' Covenant.

For more information on Veteran Card benefits visit the Veteran Card page of the DVA website (dva.gov.au and search for 'Veteran Card').

If you haven't received your new Veteran Card by the end of October 2020, please call us on 1800 VETERAN (1800 838 372) or you can order a new card through your MyService account.

### Using your Veteran Card

Some veterans have had questions about how they use their new Veteran's Cards.

Veterans seeking appointments with any medical or allied health provider should always call their provider prior to their appointments to ensure that the provider will accept their DVA Gold/White card for the full cost of treatment.

If a provider does not accept their card, ask your general practitioner (GP) for help in finding another provider.

## PRIOR APPROVAL

Sometimes, DVA may need to provide ptior financial approval to fund particular treatments that are not listed on the Medicare Benefits Schedule (MBS). Prior approval must be obtained before the treatment is provided to ensure DVA will fund the full cost of treatment.

Clients should ask their provider to request prior approval by contacting DVA on 1800 550 457 (option 3).

For White Card only holders, treatment must relate to accepted conditions. If the client or provider is not sure whether treatment directly relates to a client's accepted condition(s), they should call DVA on the number above to determine eligibility before treatment starts.

Should your treating provider have any questions about this process, they can contact DVA's Provider Line on 1800 550 457 (Option 1) or email health.approval@dva. gov.au.

## VETERAN GOLD CARD

Show your card whenever you visit your health care provider. DVA usually covers medical treatment if you see a provider who accepts your Gold Card. DVA may need to approve some services before you receive them. Go to www.dva.gov.au/gold-card for more information.

## VETERAN WHITE CARD

Show your card whenever you visit a healthcare provider for the conditions it covers. DVA usually covers medical treatment by a provider who accepts your White Card. However, DVA may need to approve some services before you receive them. Go to www. dva.gov.au/white-card for more information.

## **VETERAN ORANGE CARD**

When you visit your doctor for a prescription, show your Orange Card so they can prescribe your items through the Repatriation Pharmaceutical Benefits Scheme (RPBS).

### VISITING THE PHARMACY

You also need to show your Veteran Card when you take your prescription to the pharmacy. If you do not, you may be charged more and the purchase may not count towards your RPBS Safety Net Threshold.

Our Emergency Alarms provide you and your loved one's peace of mind and security. They can be used to call Ambulance, Police, or Fire Brigade. These machines are totally independent of telephones and the NBN. They operate over the 3G and 4G Mobile networks.

The machine is activated by pressing the button on the pendant on a neck cord or wrist band. A Fall Detector can be programmed into the emergency medical alarm. The pendants and fall detectors are water proof and we recommend they be worn in the shower.

The call center is located at Eagle Farm in Brisbane and duplicated in New Zealand and you receive the same prompt efficient service from either center. The call center operates 24/7 every day of the year and the operators are all qualified Aid Responders.

The Emergency Medical Alarm staff at Kedron-Wavell Sub Branch RSL Inc. are all volunteers and can help you with all of your enquiries and arrange a suitable time for our qualified installers to provide your new alarm. Installation is within a few days.

Group demostrations can be arranged for group orginisations.




